"HORRIBLE MASSACRE"

On January 25, 1865, Co. E. 5th
United States Colored Cavalry
(USCC) attacked by Confederate
guerillas while driving herd of
900 cattle to Louisville. About
22 men killed and at least eight
severely wounded. Based at Camp
Nelson, nearly all of the recruits
were former slaves. The 5th also
fought in 1864 Saltville battles.

AFRICAN AMERICAN CEMETERY

The 5th USCC troopers killed in 1865 Simpsonville slaughter were buried in a mass grave by local residents. Area used as African American cometery. Members of the Trim #2 United Brothers of Friendship Lodge operated the cemetery until the last member died in 1965. Lodge hall located in Simpsonville.

Location: 1/2 mile west of Simpsonville, US 60, Shelby County, Kentucky.
